## A Classroom Highlight: Ms. Robinson's Chemistry Class

During the month of October, Ms. Holly Robinson's chemistry class learned about molecular geometry and polarity.



Don't worry, we will break it down....

### What is a molecule?

A group of atoms bonded together, representing the smallest fundamental unit of a chemical compound that can take part in a chemical reaction.

In chemistry, a **polar bond** is a type of bond between two or more dissimilar atoms, in which electrons are shared unequally.

Molecular geometry refers to the three-dimensional structure or arrangement of atoms in a molecule.

In chemistry class, CGLA students completed a rotation lab to demonstrate some effects of molecular polarity. Students mixed multiple substances to observe their interactions. Students discovered that water is very polar and isopropyl alcohol is not nearly as polar. Students also created Lewis structures to visualize the geometry and polarity of molecules.

### Questions to ask your chemistry student...

- Can I see your Lewis structure that you drew in class?
- What is a Lewis structure and how did you use it?
- Tell me about the difference between water's polarity and isopropyl alcohol's polarity. What was the main difference that you noticed?

# DAY OF THE DEAD Fun Facts.....



### 1. It's not the same as Halloween

While Halloween is celebrated Oct. 31, *Día de los Muertos* is celebrated right after, on Nov. 2. Many communities that celebrate *Día de los Muertos* also celebrate Halloween.

### 2. It originated in Mexico and Central America

Día de los Muertos originated in ancient Mesoamerica (Mexico and northern Central America) where indigenous groups, including Aztec, Maya and Toltec, had specific times when they commemorated their loved ones who had passed away. Certain months were dedicated to remembering the departed, based on whether the deceased was an adult or a child.

### 3. It's a celebration of life, not death

Ancient Mesoamericans believed that death was part of the journey of life. Rather than death ending life, they believed that new life came from death. This cycle is often associated with the cyclical nature of agriculture, whereby crops grow from the ground where the last crop lies buried.

### 4. The ofrenda is a central component

The *ofrenda* is often the most recognized symbol of *Día de los Muertos*. This temporary altar is a way for families to honor their loved ones and provide them what they need on their journey. They place down pictures of the deceased, along with items that belonged to them and objects that serve as a reminder of their lives.

### 5. Flowers, butterflies and skulls are typically used as symbols

The *cempasúchil*, a type of marigold flower native to Mexico, is often placed on *ofrendas* and around graves. With their strong scent and vibrant color the petals are used to make a path that leads the spirits from the cemetery to their families' homes.

Monarch butterflies play a role in *Día de los Muertos* because they are believed to hold the spirits of the departed. This belief stems from the fact that the first monarchs arrive in Mexico for the winter each fall on Nov. 1, which coincides with *Día de los Muertos*.

### **TARDY TO SCHOOL**

Tardiness will be handled as a disciplinary infraction. Prompt arrival is the responsibility of the student and parent. Students who are transported by parents or drive themselves and arrive late will be counted as tardy. A student is considered tardy to school if she is not present in her assigned class by 7:45 am. Students who are tardy to school must be accompanied by a parent or guardian and report immediately to the main office for a tardy admission slip. This tardy admission slip must be presented to the first teacher the student has that school day.

### ☐ First Tardy

Verbal Warning when parent arrives with student to school.

### Second Tardy

Verbal Warning and parent called by CGLA staff (truancy) to explain tardy policy.

### ☐ Third Tardy

Parent/student/Truancy Officer – conference and one (1) day administrative detention issued to the student.

### Fourth Tardy

Parent called by CGLA staff (truancy). Two (2) days of administrative detention issued to the student.
